Four Westinghouse Winners Make Gables Second In Nation

Four students from Coral Gables Senior High School have been named to the Top 40 in the 21st Annual Westinghouse Science Talent Search. Only one other school in the United States was able to top the Gables total. Erasmus has 5 students in the Top 40.

Until this year the highest total for any school was 4. No school outside of New York has been able to accumulate 4 winners in one year. Gables High is the first.

The four students were selected from the Honors Group winners announced earlier this year. Gables High had ranked third in the nation in Honors Group winners with a total of 13.

The 4 students who by winning this honor will be given a trip to Washington during the first week in March are Jack Catlin, Mike Machtey, Mitch Fruitstone and Jane-Carol Johnson.

They were selected upon the basis of a written examination taken last December and a scientific project also completed during last December.

While the four students are in Washington they will be interviewed by specialists concerning the projects they made. The trip will be climaxed by a banquet at which the annual Westinghouse scholarships will be announced. A total of \$34,250 in scholarship money is given away each year. Mr. Walter D. Bowlby, the director of the Gables Westinghouse team, has set as his goal for this year, to get some of that money for a Gables student.

No one from Coral Gables Senior High has ever won any of the Westinghouse money.

Grading System Inadequate

Students Demand Changes

It is time for the school board to listen to the complaints of the students and make the necessary changes to improve the inadequacies in Dade County's academic grading system.

One of the largest problems which faces students is to attempt compensating for the inadequate grading system used in the schools of this county. As students, the teenagers have learned that A, B, C, D, and F have no real meaning to anyone.

How can a college properly evaluate the merits of two applicants with B's on their permanent record when they have no idea that one student made two A's and two B's during the semester and the other made three B's and a C?

The colleges are given no indication as to the student's relative ability. There is a great difference between a student with a 3.6 average and another with a 2.75. In spite of the great difference in students, there is no difference in grade; they are both given a B.

Both high schools and colleges throughout the nation have heeded the cries against uninformative grading systems such as the one used in Dade County. One of the best substitutes they have used is simply a scale from 0-100. This is the very scale that teachers in Dade County use to determine a student's grade. We take the grade and round it off to a letter so that 94-100 is an A, 86-93 is a B, etc.

Why not place the numerical grade on the student's permanent record so that his true accomplishment can be seen?

It is understandable that a letter grade is definitive enough to show whether or not a student is doing above average, average, or below average work. This is an acceptable way to allow people to know these three general categories. But it certainly isn't adequate for determining whether or not a student has been doing well enough to go to the college of his choice.

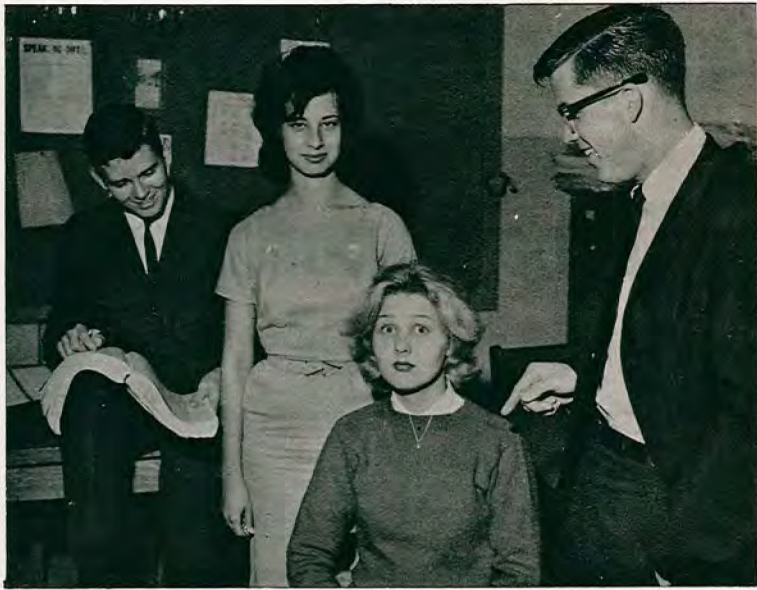

Messengers Send Paris Concert

Benny Golson, tenor sax; Lee Morgan, trumpet; Bobby Timmons, piano; Jimmy Meritt, bass; Art Blakey, drums.

In this live performance, recorded at the Olympia Auditorium in Paris, one can easily see what distinguishes the Messengers from the run-of-the-mill "soul" groups which are currently playing. Urged on by the fierce and frenzied drumming of Blakey, who is probably the loudest drummer of today, the Messengers blow the fiery solos for which they are famous. Morgan is consistent throughout when he solos --especially on "Moanin'", the fantastic number by Bobby Timmons, which is by far the best track on the record. Listen to Timmon's soulful solo on it. Also done on the album is "I Remember Clifford", Benny Golson's composition in memory of Clifford Brown, the great trumpeter recently killed in an automobile accident.

All of the tracks are good, but Blakey's cymbals were over-recorded, especially on "Moanin'". This has a tendency to distract from the soloists, although it adds to the energy.

This record is certainly not for those who like relaxing music, but it is a good sample of the fiery jazz turned out by Blakey.

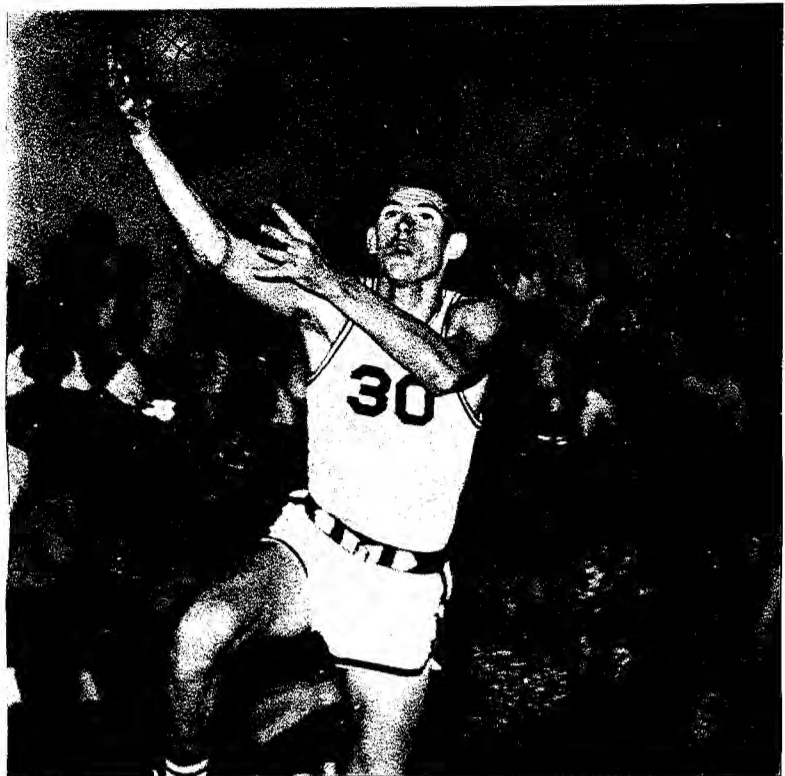

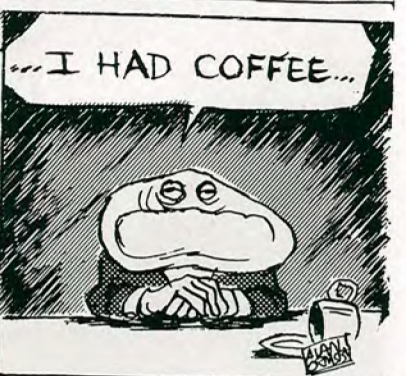
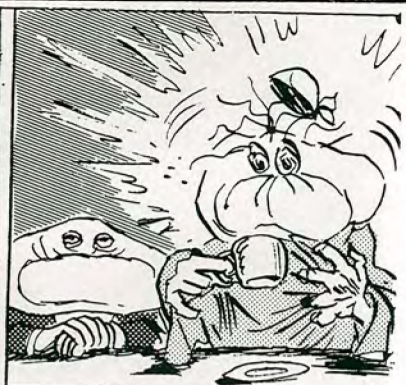
